Grow - Define - Deliver Together



An employer engagement event hosted by the Mid Wales Regional Skills Partnership (RSP) took place on 23 March to give businesses of Mid Wales an opportunity to come together and talk about what they need for the future to meet their business goals.

Held at the Metropole Hotel, Llandrindod Wells, support and guidance on procurement, tendering, recruitment, skills, and training was available to businesses who attended. In addition, it was an opportunity for networking and exploring the opportunities around upskilling, training and apprenticeships.

Key topics were explored in a round table discussion including Green Skills and Net Zero; looking at ways to prepare and adapt organisations and supply chains for the green economy, identifying green skills for the workforce and how these can be achieved.

During the event the Mid Wales Regional Skills Partnership Employment and Skills Plan 2022-2025 was officially launched. More about this later on in our newsletter.

If you missed the event but would like to get involved with the work of the Regional Skills Partnership you may be interested in joining our Business Cluster Group that we are setting up. We are seeking business leaders/experts from within Mid Wales to join this group which aims to help the RSP identify and address the barriers and issues affecting businesses in Mid Wales.

The cluster group is an advisory subgroup of the RSP whose members include industry and business leaders. More members are needed to ensure there is a balance of representatives from different sectors and a variety in micro, medium and large businesses.


Mid Wales Regional Skills Partnership Employment and Skills Plan 2022-2025

Launched at the Grow - Define - Deliver Together event, the Plan identifies key sectors and skills, priorities for regional investment to support jobs and growth in the Mid Wales region and sets out the mechanism to create a more prosperous skills infrastructure for the region for the next 3 years and beyond.

Growth Deal News

At the Growing Mid Wales Board meeting held on 28 March, key documents have been approved, moving the Mid Wales Growth Deal a step closer to unlocking £110m combined funding from both the UK and Welsh Governments.

The updated Strategic Portfolio Business Case, which is the overarching document detailing how the Growth Deal Portfolio will be delivered and meet its objectives, will now be submitted to both Governments along with vital supporting documents so that they can consider issuing the first tranche of funding for the Mid Wales Growth Deal.

Open Call For Mid Wales Shared Prosperity Fund Applicants

From 20 March, projects operating in the Local Authority areas of Ceredigion and Powys can present their outline applications for funding in a series of two open funding calls.

The UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF) will support the Levelling Up objectives, that seek to:

- Boost productivity, pay, jobs and living standards by growing the private sector, especially in those places where they are lagging
- Spread opportunities and improve public services, especially in those places where they are weakest
- Restore a sense of community, local pride and belonging, especially in those places where they have been lost
- Empower local leaders and communities, especially in those places lacking local agency
- Through the Multiply Programme, increase levels of functional numeracy in the adult population

Please note that the Local Authority areas of Ceredigion and Powys are in receipt of individual allocations for the UK SPF. If you intend submitting a regional bid, please contact both authorities to discuss further.

• When did you start with the team?

I joined the team in July 2021 when the Portfolio Management Office was first being established.

• What are your current priorities?

We've recently been updating our overarching Portfolio Business Case which provides the latest information on the programmes and projects within the Portfolio and how together they will meet our objectives for the Growth Deal. It's a bit of a beast of a document and is very detailed but shows the work going on behind the scenes to progress the Growth Deal, both what we've achieved to date and what lies ahead.

This is all part of demonstrating to both Governments that we are ready to receive the Growth Deal funding and start delivering so it's a big deal! Of course progressing the projects is a major part of that so we are working closely with project sponsors on the next stages of their business case development. It's not a straight forward process and I think we're all learning!

What developments have you seen over the years?

Before taking up my role with GMW, I worked for two Local Enterprise Partnerships, mostly with Northamptonshire and more recently Leicestershire. The majority of that time I managed the delivery of various Government-funded programmes which have supported some amazing projects. There have been some big ones such as Catesby Aerodynamic Research Facility in Northants and SportPark in Loughborough but I think some of the most rewarding ones were grants to businesses where a relatively small amount of funding helped a business develop, grow - making such a difference.

Now I'm part of the Mid Wales team, I'm really looking forward to seeing the projects within the Growth Deal come to fruition. Exciting times ahead!

• What's been your biggest achievement?

Fact of the month: Newtown apprentice who became a world famous entrepreneur

Sir Pryce Pryce-Jones

Sir Pryce Pryce-Jones (16 October 1834 - 11 January 1920) was a Welsh entrepreneur who formed the first mail order business, revolutionising how products were sold. Creating the first mail order catalogues in 1861 - which consisted of woollen goods – customers for the first time could order by post, and the goods were delivered by railway.

Pryce-Jones was born in Llanllwchaiarn, just outside Newtown, Montgomeryshire. He left school at 12 and was apprenticed to a local draper, John Davies; he took over Davies's business in 1856.

Pryce-Jones became hugely successful in the United Kingdom where he had over 100,000 customers, which included Florence Nightingale and Queen Victoria. In England he was able to promise next-day delivery. His business also took off overseas, selling Welsh flannel to the rest of Europe, the United States followed by Australia. During the 1870s he took part in exhibitions all over the world, winning several awards, and he became world famous.

In 1879, he built the Royal Welsh Warehouse, a tall red brick building in the centre of Newtown which still stands today and is the <u>new Business Wales enterprise hub</u>.
